
HAPPY FALL SDATFACS MEMBERS!!

- The amount of time available to complete a task is the amount of time it will take. If I give myself all day to plan a lesson, it will take all day. Use timers to help you manage your time, and teach students to do the same.
- Students are adaptable and resilient don't underestimate them.
- You are adaptable and resilient don't underestimate yourself.

If you have not yet opened your doors, we are sending you "healthy" wishes that the year kicks off to a good start. Knowing how much you already have to juggle this year, we wanted to let you know that we have made the determination to extend the timeline for completing the full CTE-Comprehensive Local Needs Assessment (CTE-CLNA). As such, with the exception of a handful of pilot schools (thank you to our volunteers!) we will not be asking you to commit to data digs and root cause analysis specific to the full CLNA. Those will take place during the 2021-22 school year.

We also know that it is important to continue to hone those data skills and familiarize yourselves with the data that are newly available under Perkins V. With that in mind, keep an eye out for January Improve trainings on how to access and how to use your new Perkins V data tools. These options will be spread over several weeks and largely via Zoom to make the best use of your valuable time.
