

Scrub Camps are a great opportunity for high school students interested in health careers to explore various careers in one day. At Scrub Camps, students gain hands-on experience alongside health professionals: physicians, nurses, medical laboratory scientists, rad technologists, dental hygienists and many more!

The first Scrub Camp of the year is in Vermillion on Tuesday, March 4; the second is at Lakota Tech High School in Pine Ridge on Wednesday, March 19; and the third and final Scrub Camp of the year will be at the USD-Sioux Falls campus on Wednesday, May 7. Camps typically start at 9 a.m. and end around 2:30 p.m. and are funded through the South Dakota Department of Health.

Legislative Update

Let us start by saying "thank you" for coming together in opposition to the school voucher related bills. House Bill 1020 and House Bill 1009 were sent to the 41st day by the Education Committee. This means they are essentially killed for this session. We are guessing the voucher topic will continue to be discussed and will most likely re-surface, if not this session in future years. It will be important that we stay unified against voucher related legislation. Public tax dollars should stay with Public Schools.

The other pressing legislative issues is the annual increase to education funding which is the primary funding source for teacher salaries. 1.25% is the current proposed increase that is on the table in the legislature. Unfortunately, this increase is not even enough to cover inflationary cost increases. Please join us in reaching out to legislators asking for them to increase this percentage as it is the main source of public education funding in South Dakota.

SDACTE Scholarship Opportunities By: Alex Toupal

The South Dakota Association of Career and Technical Education Scholarship Committee met during the 2024 South Dakota ACTE Summer Conference to discuss changes for the upcoming scholarship. The only change that was made this year to the application is the Letter of Recommendation question was changed to specify clearer that this letter must come from an approved CTE Instructor.

The SDACTE Scholarship Committee is comprised of members from all clusters that come together in the spring to review award applications. These committee members select 4 recipients each year to present a \$1,000 scholarship to at the annual summer conference. The scholarship committee will select at minimum one high school student and one post-secondary student. The remaining two scholarships will be based on overall score calculations. The 2025 Scholarship Application will be released on January 6th, 2025, and due April 1st, 2025.

WHEREAS South Dakota public schools are a cornerstone of the state and the pride of their communities, welcoming all children, educating and feeding them, connecting them with friends and mentors and helping shape their future while preparing them to be the next generation of our state's workforce;

WHEREAS the proposed Education Savings Account (ESA) – for the 2025 legislative session – is simply a different title for a school voucher program;

WHEREAS research indicates school voucher programs consistently fail to improve academic outcomes;

WHEREAS the proposed program will be implemented by using millions in public taxpayer dollars to fund non-public schools that may pick and choose who they admit while also charging tuition and raising millions of dollars in scholarship funds or to fund homeschool programs with no transparency or accountability measures to prove success similar to those required of public schools;

WHEREAS the state budget, which provides the funding increase for public education, faces constraints due to stagnant revenue collections and as a result, the proposed increase in state aid for public schools is less than the level of inflation;

WHEREAS with lower-than-expected revenue collections creating a lean state budget the introduction of a new, ongoing funding system for a school voucher program will eventually lead to an unbalanced state budget or a decrease in funding for public education;

WHEREAS the school voucher program will not stop at the initial amount, as the intention to grow school voucher funding has already been stated even before it has been adopted;

WHEREAS the school voucher program's planned and inevitable growth will be damaging to the future of our public school system, students and communities;

WHEREAS we, as School Board members, insist our legislators oppose the proposed school voucher program because of the foreseeable detrimental impact it will have on South Dakota's public school system at the expense of our students;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, we, the South Dakota Association for Career and Technical Education oppose the proposed school voucher program for the 2025 legislative session.
